The association is the second option chosen by a donor for coronating his grave. If the leadership of the  $\epsilon$ ργασία τῶν λινωτῶν, *ergasia ton linoton* (l. 7) does not fulfill its obligations (distributing money to the members on a certain date), they shall give twice the amount to the φιλόπλοι, *philoploi*, so that they can carry out the coronation.

The association is the second option after the ἐργασία τῶν λινώτων, *ergasia ton linoton*, which may point to a certain rivalry.

i. Private association Probable

**Note** Since the ἐργασία τῶν λινώτων, *ergasia ton linoton* is mentioned in a parallel position in the inscription,

it is reasonable to suppose that the φιλόπλοι, *philoploi*, were an association as well.
