ii. Leadership	According to Dunand 1986: 92, the poet Philiskos, priest of Dionysus (Ath. 198 c: Φιλίσκος ὁ ποιητὴς ἱερεὺς ὧν Διονύσου, <i>Philiskos ho poietes hierous on Dionysou</i>), who took part in the procession together with the <i>technitai</i> , was probably their president.
iii. Members	The members are collectively called οἱ περὶ τὸν Διόνυσον τεχνῖται, <i>hoi peri ton Dionyson technitai</i> .

ii. Gender	Men
Note	Given the character of the association it seems certain that the members were all men.
iii. Age	Adults
Note	On the basis of the type of association, the <i>technitai</i> were probably all adults.
