VII. ORGANIZATION

iv. Officials	ἀρχιγραμματεὺς, <i>archigrammateus</i> (ll. 3-4). As is the case at Ephesos, the <i>xystos</i> at Erythrai is attested only in a personal titlature. But while at Ephesos the titles are always <i>archiereus</i> and <i>xystarches</i> , the "chief secretary" seems to refer to specific duties. Maybe <i>xystos</i> , chosen by the deceased's wife in his funerary inscription, actually refers to the <i>synodos</i> .
