iii.	Members	The members may be generically called οἱ πε]ρὶ τὸν Στοτοῆτις (l. Στοτοῆτιν) hoi peri ton Stotoetin (ll. 10-11).

Note	On the basis of the organisation and the fact that the <i>presbyteroi</i> of the <i>synodos</i> hired some musicians for the entertainment of 'the <i>synodos</i> of those around Stotoetis' (II. 10-11), it is possible that the group here was a private association. However, one cannot exclude with certainty the fact that the term <i>synodos</i> may have referred to the priestly college of the temple.
