Despite the partly preservation of the name, the elements *thiasitai* and *koinon* as constituent parts of the name strongly support the private nature of the group. What remains uncertain is the internal organisation and durability of the group. However, the fact that the group collected money and contributed among other individuals and other associations to a common endeavour (i.e. building works in the sanctuary of Asklepios) indicates that this was an organised group.
