Note	Poland 1909: 26, 104 argues that these <i>thiasoi</i> are rather to be regarded as public subdivisions, as they appear side by side with the <i>boule</i> and the <i>demos</i> . However, as <i>thiasoi</i> of the gymnasion are often attested on Aiginetan gravestones and their nature is debated in related research, there is no certainty about the public or private cultic character of the <i>peri tonklea thiasotai</i> .
