An altar was dedicated by the syngeneis to Zeus Pappoos or Patroos.

ii.	Realty

The altar dedicated by the *syngeneis* probably belonged to the group.

iii. Worship	The altar dedicated to Zeus <i>Pappoos</i> or <i>Patroos</i> by the <i>syngeneis</i> following the instructions received by the god (II. 2-3: κατὰ ἐπιταγὴν, <i>kata epitagen</i>) suggests that the group of relatives performed cultic activities addressed to that deity. The dedication possibly followed or anticipated a benefaction perceived to have been provided by the god.

i.	Comments	The dedication was addressed to Δ ι Παππώφ ($Dii\ Pappooi$, 1. 2) but S. Şahin (in I.Iznik 1513, p. 289b) thinks that the correct reading may have been Δ ιὶ Πατρώφ, $Dii\ Patrooi$. If the <i>syngeneis</i> constituted a formally established group, the cost of the altar may indicate the existence of a common treasury. However, there is no clear proof for that. The cost may have been covered from <i>ad hoc</i> contributions paid by the members of the group.

Note	On associations defined as <i>syngeneia</i> or with other correlated terms, see Poland 1909: 88. The dedication of the altar suggests lasting cultic activities on the part of the <i>syngeneis</i> . However, it cannot be established with certainty whether this term in our inscription corresponded to an organized association or was used to denote a simple group of relatives which dedicated the altar.
