The <i>technitai</i> possibly acted as envoys of Teos in the Greek cities in late 3rd c. BC, asking the privileges of <i>asylia</i> for the city and its citizens (cf. the official emissaries to Samothrace, IG XII 8, 163). They joined the association of Dionysos <i>technitai</i> of Pergamon after 188 BC.</p>

i. Comments	The seat of the Association was in Teos from mid 3rd c. to 146 BC but due to a dispute with the city they moved to Myonessos and then to Lebedos. The envoy matter indicates the intervention of the association in public affairs.
