Formal interaction with Rome and the Imperial institution are to be argued from the terms *philosebastos* kai philoromaios synodos (1. 2). It was also a travelling synodos (περιπολιστική, peripolistike, 1. 3), so we can assume that there was enough interaction abroad. The synodos honored Flavius Acribius, who

was a Roman citizen and highpriest for life of the whole athletic *xystos*, see Moretti 1953: 190-1.
