iv. Officials	Psentotoes may have been the secretary of this association. The abbreviation of γ(), possibly for γραμματεὺς <i>grammateus</i> , following his name at ll. 2, 8, 9, 11 seems to suggest this.

iii. Income	Contributions are made in measures (and jars?) of wine by members for meetings and celebrations (?).
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IX. MEMBERSHIP

i. Number	10, although the repetitive nature of the document either suggests that members made several payments/donations during the month of Mesore, or that the account covered a longer period of time.
ii. Gender	Men
Note	The recorded names are male names.
v. Relations	Two sets of father-son. Psentotoes may be father to Am(m)onios (son of Psentotoes); Phthoumonthes may be father to Pamonthes, son of Phthoumonthes.
vi. Proper names and physical features	Psentotoes; Phthoumonthes; Apollonios; Sisois, son of Apollonios; Am(m)onios, son of Psentotoes; Pamonthes, son of Phthoumonthes; Pekysis, son of Kametis; Senkametis; Pekysis; Psenkalames

i. Comments	It is perhaps worth noting that Psentotoes (as secretary or not) is the most frequent contributor here.
