vii. Judicial system

Although the text is fragmentary, it seems that there were regulations regarding debts of members (l. 1: δ]φίλημα (l. ἀφείλημα) ἴδιον, *opheilema idion*), possibility of suing members in court (presumably because of debts, l. 2: ἐνκαλεῖν, *enkalein*), as well as regarding the proper behaviour to maintain during drinking parties (l. 4: μηδένα δὲ δασύνειν τὴν οἰνοποσίαν, μηδὲ ἀκοσ[μ]ίαν παρέχειν, *medena de dasynein ten oinoposian, mede akosmian parechein*) and in case of verbal or physical violence or abuse among members (ll. 6-8). Those who did not comply were punished with a fine (ll. 3, 4, and 6: ζημωθήσεται, *zemiothesetai*).

VIII. PROPERTY AND POSSESSIONS

i. Treasury/Funds

The association probably had funds and a treasury into which the fines exacted from members would be deposited.

X. ACTIVITIES

ii. Meetings and events

The association met for communal drinking, in which wine was drunk: οἶνοποσίαι, oinoposiai (Il. 4-5).
