Interaction abroad	The <i>technitai</i> of Ionia and the Hellespont were the recipients of prayers along with the demos of Elaians and the Romans in a decree passed by the city of Elaia after its allegiance with Rome. According to Le Guen (1997) the <i>technitai</i> , who were based in Pergamon, were invited to Elaia to participate in the festivals (Il. 48-61).
