i. Private association Note Certain The character of the group as a private association of Dionysian athletes is clear. The group may have had the designation of ἡ σπεῖρα Διονυσιαστῶν νεωτέρων, he speira Dionysiaston neoteron by analogy with CAPInv. 1218.
