### VI. BUILT AND VISUAL SPACE

## i. Archaeological remains Sarapieion B (GD 96) lies in the Inopos river valley, on a terrace west of the Sanctuary of the Oriental Gods. It was probably constructed at the end of the 3rd or the beginning of the 2nd c. BC, as suggested by a dedication that dates to 196 BC (CAP Inv. 222). It seems to have fallen out of use sometime in the period of the Second Athenian Occupation.

Sarapieion B may not have operated as a sanctuary of Sarapis but rather as a meeting place of associations centered around the cult of the Egyptian gods, appropriately equipped with dining facilities for banquets.

iv.	Status	Kineas son of Agorallos was a Delian.
v.	Relations	Kineas should probably be identified with the homonymous priest Kineas in IG XI.4 1260 (RICIS no. 202/0136); 1258 (RICIS no. 202/0137); IG XI.4 1261 (RICIS no. 202/0138). All inscriptions attesting to Kineas were found in Sarapieion B.

### XII. NOTES

i. Comments

Sarapieion B has yielded a number of inscriptions attesting to six associations, active within its premises (<u>CAP Inv. 215</u>; <u>CAP Inv. 216</u>; <u>CAP Inv. 217</u>; <u>CAP Inv. 218</u>; <u>CAP Inv. 219</u>; <u>CAP Inv. 222</u>;). All inscriptions date to the first half of the 2nd c. BC. A certain degree of connectivity is to be noted among the various associations on the basis of individuals who were members of more than one association (see esp. <u>CAP Inv. 218</u>).
