i.c.	Physical format(s)	Marble slab broken into two fragments (H. 32 x W. 136 x Th. 18 cm). The slab constitutes the right part of a long pedestal (4.50 m long), originally consisting of four slabs (three preserved). Three wreaths are engraved on each slab. The names of three associations that crowned Kineas are incised within each wreath.

VI. BUILT AND VISUAL SPACE

i. Archaeological remains	Sarapieion B (GD 96) lies in the Inopos river valley, on a terrace west of the Sanctuary of the Oriental
	Gods. It was probably constructed at the end of the 3rd or the beginning of the 2nd c. BC, as suggested
	by a dedication that dates to 196 BC (CAP Inv. 222). It seems to have fallen out of use sometime in the
	period of the Second Athenian Occupation. Sarapieion B may not have operated as a sanctuary of
	Sarapis but rather as a meeting place of associations centered around the cult of the Egyptian gods,

appropriately equipped with dining facilities for banquets.

iv.	Status	Kineas son of Agorallos was a Delian.
v.	Relations	Kineas should probably be identified with the homonymous priest in IG XI.4 1260 (RICIS no. 202/0136); 1258 (RICIS no. 202/0137); IG XI.4 1261 (RICIS no. 202/0138). All inscriptions attesting to Kineas were found in Sarapieion B.

iii.	Worship	Thank-offering (charisterion, IG XI.4 1226, 1. 1) to Sarapis, Isis and Anubis.

Comments	Sarapieion B has yielded a number of inscriptions attesting to six associations, active within its premises (<u>CAP Inv. 215</u> ; <u>CAP Inv. 216</u> ; <u>CAP Inv. 217</u> ; <u>CAP Inv. 218</u> ; <u>CAP Inv. 219</u> ; <u>CAP Inv. 222</u>). All inscriptions date to the first half of the 2nd c. BC. A certain degree of connectivity is to be noted among the various associations on the basis of individuals who were members of more than one association (see esp. <u>CAP Inv. 218</u>).
