VI. BUILT AND VISUAL SPACE

i. Archaeological remains	Excavations in the west slope of the Akropolis in autumn 1892 revealed an open-air, trapezoidal <i>temenos</i> , 17x15m with foundations of a <i>peribolos</i> , the base of a marble offering table, and a well identified by inscriptions with a sanctuary of Amynos. Among the finds were sculpture (reliefs, statuettes, terracotta statuettes), pottery, and inscriptions (decrees, dedications to Asklepios and Amynos); see Koerte 1896. Summary account in Wycherley 1970: 292-3; Travlos 1980: 76-77; Rietmueller 2005: II 12-17 no. 4 and Greco 2010: 265-7. See also Skalta 2016.
ii. References to buildings/objects	There is a reference to a sanctuary (<i>ἱερόν, hieron</i>) (IG II ² 1252, ll. 11, 16; IG II ² 1253, l. 11) and <i>stelai</i> to be set up (IG II ² 1252, l. 18; IG II ² 1253, l. 11).

iii. Members	The members of the group are called invariably ὄψεων, <i>orgeones</i> , IG II ² 1252, ll. 2-3, 8, 14, 19-20, IG II ² 1253, ll. 2, 6, IG II ² 1259, 8.
iv. Officials	Hosts, <i>ιστιάτορες, histiatores</i> , IG II ² 1259, ll. 1-2. Ferguson 1944: 86-87 thinks that the individuals honoured in IG II ² 1252 and IG II ² 1253 were also hosts.

VIII. PROPERTY AND POSSESSIONS

ii. Realty	The association had two sanctuaries (<i>ἱερά, hiera</i> , IG II ² 1252, ll. 16-7; Ferguson 1944: 87). Mikalson 1998: 145 believes that there were two groups in charge of the two shrines.

iv. Status	The individuals mentioned in IG II ² 1252 and one in IG II ² 1253 are citizens, while the remaining in IG II ² 1259 are most probably citizens.
v. Relations	Those honoured in IG II ² 1252 are brothers.

X. ACTIVITIES

iii. Worship	Sacrifices (θυσίαι, <i>thysiai</i>) are mentioned in IG II ² 1252, ll. 12-3 and IG II ² 1259, l. 5.
Deities worshipped	Three deities are worshipped, namely Amynos, Asklepios and Dexion (according to a late scholion heroized Sophokles?), for which see Kearns 1989: 147 (Amynos) and Kearns 1989: 154 (Dexion).
iv. Honours/Other activities	In IG II ² 1252 the group praises the sons of Philinos and awards them a golden crown (χρυσοῦς στέφανος, <i>chrysous stephanos</i>) and also access to wine free of charge (IG II ² 1252, l. 11: ἀτέλειαν τοῦ χοῦ atelean tou chou) to themselves and their descendants. In IG II ² 1253, ll. 7-10 the group praises and awards golden crowns, while in IG II ² 1259, ll. 6-7 the group praises but awards olive leaves crown.
