The two individuals are honoured because they took good care (καλῶς καὶ φιλοτίμως, kalos kai philotimos, ll. 4-5) of the sacrifices (θυσίαι, thysiai) and all the common affairs, ll. 5-7.	

i.	Comments	The decree passed in the archonship of Klearchos. Mikalson 1998: 147 n.28 considers that the individuals honoured the decree are of Cypriot origin: this is something totally arbitrary, as well as the claim that both individuals were called Drakon.
