ii. References to buildings/objects	The list should be inscribed on a stone slab (στήλη λίθινη, <i>stèle lithine</i> , l. 6) and erected in the sanctuary (ιερόν, <i>hieron</i> , l. 7).

iii. Members	The members are called Σαβαζιασταί, <i>Sabaziastai</i> . Those who have contributed are called ἐρανισταί, <i>eranistai</i> , l. 5-6.
iv. Officials	Priest (ιερεύς, <i>hiereus</i> , l. 8). Secretary (γραμματεὺς, <i>grammateus</i> , l. 11). Steward (ἐπιμελητής, <i>epimeletes</i> , l. 12). Treasurer (ταμίας, <i>tamias</i> , l. 10). Noteworthy is that the last three offices are undertaken by the same person.

ii. Realty	The sanctuary (ιερόν, <i>hieron</i>) possibly belonged to the association.
