i. Founder(s)	The phrase οὗς συνίγαγε (hous synegage) indicates that Dionysios son of Hermogenes A[lexandreus] acted as the founder of the <i>thiasitai</i> . The same formula appears in CAPInv. 38 where the goddess acts as the founder.
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VIII. PROPERTY AND POSSESSIONS

iii. Income	The dedication of the <i>agalma</i> (statue), the <i>thymiaeterion</i> (incense-burner) and the <i>libanotida</i> (frankincense-burner) seems to have been funded by the <i>thiasotai</i> in light of the suggested restoration (ἀπὸ τῶν? θιασιτῶν).
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IX. MEMBERSHIP

iv. Status	The dedicator Dionysios son of Hermogenes may have originated from Alexandria though the ethnic is heavily restored (Διονύσιος Ἐρμογένου Ά[λεξανδρεὺς]). If so, he came from a well-attested family from Alexandria active in Sarapieion C in Delos (ID 2089; 2137; 2150).

iii. Worship	The <i>thiasotai</i> are designated as the <i>thiasotai</i> of Hagne Thea.
Deities worshipped	Hagne Thea.
