i. Local interaction	The συγγένειαι, <i>syngeneiai</i> , could have been subdivisions of φυλαί, <i>phylai</i> , cf. Robert 1945 for Caria. Such συγγένειαι, <i>syngeneiai</i> , were often connected to particular cults and sanctuaries.

i.	Comments	The term συγγένεια, <i>syngeneia</i> , is also attested at Philippopolis <u>IGBulg III.1 959</u> and its territory <u>IGBulg III.1 1104</u> .
