i. Comments	The document is dated to the 20th of Gorpiaios, as is the case - 17 years earlier - with the building inscription of the <i>synetairoi</i> from the temple of Atargatis (CAPInv. 675). The documents are also linked by the use of the formal word "undersigned": οἱ ὑπογεγραμμένοι συνέταιροι, <i>hoi hypogegrammenoi synetairoi</i> (YCIS 14 (1955): 129-31, no. 2, ll. 3-4); οἱ ὑπογεγραμμένοι ἀπὸ τῆς ἑταιρείας, <i>hoi hypogegrammenoi apo tes hetaireias</i> (Dura-Europos V, no. 418, ll. 2-3). These similarities do not mean that the two groups are identical, but rather suggest a common environment for cultic associations at Dura. Unfortunately, the details escape us.
