i. Comments	In IG V.1 1543 the reading of the name of the group appears as $[\phi\iota] < \lambda > o\sigma\epsilon\beta\dot{\alpha}[\sigma]\tau\omega\nu$ ($[phi] < l > oseba[s]ton$), whilst the majuscule of the text shows that the reading is not at all certain. Sandberg (1954: 9 no. 6) suggests $\Delta\iota o\sigma\epsilon\rho\alpha\pi\iota(\alpha\sigma)\tau\hat{\omega}\nu$, $Dioserapi(as)ton$. This seems more compatible with the majuscule given in IG. Both suggestions, $Dioserapi(as)tai$ and the earlier reading $Philosebastoi$, display a cultic element. Generally on the sea routes around the Cape Maleas, see Henning 2002.
