Comments	Edson, in the apparatus of the IG, offers a full list of the proposed restorations of the text, some of which restore the name of Zeus, or even Zeus <i>Hypsistos</i> , as the name of the deity worshiped. Given that the very probable restoration Αλέ[ξανδρ]ον <i>Alexandron</i> in Il. 2-3 is only possible epigraphically if one restores some of the missing letters at the end of l. 2, Edson is probably correct in assuming that there is text missing at the end of Il. 2-4, something that Duchesne's copy does not make clear.
