Note	Due to the fragmentary nature of the text (IG XII.7 246) and the uncertainty of the restoration ([kordaki]stai), it is difficult to say if the inscription concerns an association. The potential ending of a group name in -stai (combined with the use of hoi peri ton, known from associations of Dionysiac artists) may support the idea, but alternatively the text may simply refer to performers of kordax dances, not necessarily organized in an association.
