Not	te	The presence of an <i>archimystes</i> alone, though indicative of a group of initiates with an internal organisation, seems insufficient for a secure identification of a private association, especially if we take into account the relatively late date of the inscription (after 213 AD) and the nature of the dedication (joint dedication by a <i>chalkeus</i> and an <i>archimystes</i>).
