		In all the other lists recording the members of an association of $Temenitai$ from Miletus designate them with the substantive $Temen(e)itai$ . Only in this text, the verbal form is used.
iv.	Officials	χρυσονόμος, chrysonomos γραμματεύς, grammateus
		The $\it chrysonomos$ was the treasurer, the $\it grammateus$ the secretary of the association. Cf. Herrmann 1980: 226-227 with n. 9.
		If they were eponymous officials (cf. next field), they must have administered their office for a year.
	Eponymous officials	Both the <i>chrysonomos</i> and the <i>grammateus</i> are mentioned in the praescript after the milesian $\sigma \tau \epsilon \phi \alpha \nu \dot{\eta} \phi \rho \rho \phi c$ , <i>stephanephoros</i> , the eponymous of the city. Therefore, they seem to be the eponymous officials of the association.

i. Treasury/F	unds	Since the <i>chrysonomos</i> was the treasurer of the association, it must have had some kind of treasury.

i.	Number	10, including the 2 officials
ii.	Gender	Men
iii.	Age	Adults
iv.	Status	The civic status of the members is not specified. However, since other lists of <i>Temenitai</i> explicitly identify foreigners with their ethnicon, in this case all members seem to be citizens of Miletus.
v.	Relations	No family relations are mentioned in the list of members. However, it is likely that Oiax, s. of Hekatomnos, and Hekataios, s. of Hekatomnos, listed one after the other in ll. 14-15 are brothers.

ii. Meetings and events	No activities are described in the source. However, it is to be expected that members, like those of all other milesian associations of <i>Temnitai</i> , held meetings in the form of banquets.

iii. Worship	The designation of the members as <i>hoi temnizontes</i> and the gods listed in its name demonstrate the association's religious character.
	It is not clear how exactly the association was involved in the cult of these gods. A. Rehm (ad I.Didyma 486) saw in the temenizontes a "Verein zur Errichtung einer Kultstätte". It seems, however, likely that the members of the association were not (or not only) involved in the establishment of a temenos but rather in its maintenance in the cultic service more generally.
