		The <i>chrysonomos</i> was the treasurer, the <i>grammateus</i> the secretary of the association. Cf. Herrmann 1980: 226-227 with n. 9.
		If they were eponymous officials (cf. next field), they most probably administered their office for a year.
	Eponymous officials	Both the <i>chrysonomos</i> and the <i>grammateus</i> are mentioned in the praescript after the milesian $\sigma t = \phi \alpha v (\phi \circ \rho) c$ , stephanephoros, the eponymous of the city. Therefore, they seem to be the eponymous officials of the association.

i.	Treasury/Funds	Since the <i>chrysonomos</i> was the treasurer of the association, it must have had some kind of treasury.	
ii.	Realty	The inscription records a purchase, presumably of a plot of land (Milet VI.2 802 II. 10-11: ἠγοράσθη {ι} ὁ [τόπος?], egorasthe {i} ho [topos?] (cf. I.Didyma 486 I. 25)).	

iv. Honours/Other activities	The first part of the inscription records that the <i>chrysonomos</i> "raised" something (Milet VI.2 802 II. 2-3: [ χ]ρυσονομῶν είου ἀνεστησεν τὴν, [ch]rysonomon eiou anesthesen ten). This could refer to the construction of a building by the association (cf. Milet VI.2 799).
	The second part of the inscription seems to describe the purchase of a plot of land, but it is not clear for what purpose.

i.	Comments	The inscription does not specify the name of the association but just uses the generic term $T$ εμενε $\hat{\alpha}$ ται, $T$ emeneitai, without the usual reference to certain gods. The association could therefore be identical with one of the other milesian associations of $T$ εμεν $(\epsilon)\hat{\alpha}$ ται, $T$ emen $(\epsilon)$ itai, or τεμεν $(\epsilon)$ τας, $T$ emenizontes.
