vii. Judicial system	The association had its own internal judicial system and members had to comply to it, and were not allowed to complain to official courts. If members were not happy with the judgment, they had the right to complain to another association (l. 23-25).
viii. Obligations	The members had to give salt, crowns, beer, wine, incense, ointment and thyme to the association (l. 3 yš, \square m \square , \square lm, \square w, \square ng, \square n) They had to pay a fee of 1 kite every month (l. 6 [mtw=n] dy.t \square \square "We will give one kite").
