It is not entirely clear from the inscription whether Mnasaigos was a member of the technitai. Regardless Mnasaigos' membership profile, he was from Chalkis, honoured by the Chalkidian sub-branch of the <i>technitai</i> and his statue was apparently set up in Chalkis.
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i.	Comments	Artist's signature: In the text of the honorary inscription the name of the sculptor is partly preserved: Zo[ilos son of Demostratos] (IG XII.9 910, 1. 5). The sculptor, Zoilos son of Demostratos from Athens, is attested in Delos where he made a statue for an Athenian epimeletes in 99/8 BC (ID 2499) (Marcadé 1957: II, 137). In the light of the sculptor's activity, IG XII.9 910 should be dated in the late second/early first century BC (Le Guen 2001: 185). This date can be corroborated by a proxeny decree from Oropos for Charidemos son of Mnasaigos <i>Chalkideus</i> (Petrakos 1997 no. 217). Petrakos dates the decree after 150 BC. The honorand can be his son.
