IV. NAME AND TERMINOLOGY

ii. Name elements

Personal:	Ἄριστειδεῖοι, <i>Aristeideioi</i> - From the Greek personal name , (LGPN s.v. no. 3). The compound name likely suggests a founder or a benefactor of the association, (cf. Thomsen (forthcoming), Gabrielsen 1997 p. 126-7, Maiuri 1916 p. 141, Poland 1909 p. 73-6).
Professional:	τῶν συνεργαζαμένων τὸν ἵπποδρομον, <i>ton synergaxamenon ton Hippodromon</i> - Meaning <i>those working together on the Hippodrome</i> , it is unclear from the inscription in what capacity the association 'worked together'.
Theophoric:	Ἄλιασται, <i>Haliastai</i> - From the god Helios, a deity with a prominent position in the mythology of Rhodes (Morelli, <i>I culti in Rodi</i> [Pisa, 1959], 15-20, 94-99).
	Ἀθαναϊσται, <i>Athanaistai</i> - From the doric spelling of Athena (Morrelli, <i>ibid.</i> 2-13, 80-89).
	Ἐρμαϊσται, <i>Hermaistai</i> - From the god Hermes (Morrelli, <i>ibid.</i> 44-45, 133-35).

Note

Although the descriptive term has been omitted in this case, this should still be seen as a *koinòv*, *koinon*, since this association, quite clearly, is a subdivision of the Ἄλιασται Ἀθαναϊσται Ἐρμαϊσται Ἄριστειδεῖοι *koinòv*, *Haliastai Athanaistai Hermaistai Aristeideioi koinon* ([CAPI Inv. 2061](#))
