		SEG 35: 1381 was originally an honorific decree by the <i>demos</i> and the <i>boule</i> of the city, honoring their <i>polites</i> . Jones (1987) has plausibly argued that the last lines mentioning the <i>synodos</i> , which do not fit in syntactically and are written by a different hand, have been added later.
		Jones also dates this text considerably earlier than the ed. pr., to the beginning of the 2nd century CE, because he identifies the comic actor Sophron with the one mentioned in Arr. <i>Epict. diss.</i> 3.4.
