ii.	Leadership	The leader of the group is defined as $\dot{\alpha}[\rho]\chi u \pi \rho[0] \sigma t \alpha t \hat{\omega} v$ , archiprostaton (1. 3). His name is Sosandros, <i>Aitolos</i> : he was a military man, <i>ilarches</i> and <i>hipparches</i> .

i. Private as	sociation	Possible
Note		Given the presence of a <i>hiereus</i> and an <i>archiprostaton</i> , it is possible that the group behind the setting up of the present inscription was a private association. However, it cannot be excluded that the group was rather a military unit or something of the kind.
