	Professional:	τῶν συνεργαζομένων τὸν ἵππόδρομον, <i>ton synergaxamenon ton Hippodromon</i> - Meaning <i>those working together on the Hippodrome</i> , it is unclear from the inscription in what capacity the association 'worked together'.
	Theophoric:	Ἠλιασταί, <i>Haliastai</i> - From the god Helios, a deity with a prominent position in the mythology of Rhodes (Morelli, <i>I culti in Rodi</i> [Pisa, 1959], 15-20, 94-99). Ἀθαναισταί, <i>Athanaistai</i> - From the doric spelling of Athena (Morrelli, <i>ibid.</i> 2-13, 80-89). Ἑρμαιοσταί, <i>Hermaistai</i> - From the god Hermes (Morrelli, <i>ibid.</i> 44-45, 133-35).
	Note	Although the descriptive term has been omitted in this case, this should still be seen as a κοινὸν, <i>koinon</i> , since this association, quite clearly, is a subdivision of the Ἠλιασταί Ἀθαναισταί Ἑρμαιοσταί Ἀριστειδεῖοι κοινὸν, <i>Haliastai Athanaistai Hermaistai Aristeideioi koinon</i> (CAPInv. 2061)
