The designation *phretra* for an association has parallels in Phrygia and probably Syria (see the *archiphrator* in IGLS I 232), which is why Poland included this group. But Sartre 1982: 83 is probably correct in stating that the $\phi p \acute{\eta} \tau p \alpha$ $\Delta \alpha \theta \alpha \omega p v \acute{\omega} v$, *phretra Aathaouenon*, should be added "à la liste des noms tribaux."
