VII. ORGANIZATION

i. Founder(s)	If Nigdelis 2006: 144-5 is correct in assuming that the genitive Βειέντορος, <i>Beientoros</i> , is part of the association's name, then Beientor was probably the founder of the <i>bakcheion</i> .

XI. INTERACTION

i. Local interaction	Two different associations paid for the funerary monument of the musician Memnon: the <i>bakcheion</i> of the <i>Asianoi</i> of Beientor and the <i>theskia</i> of the Asklepiastai (CAPInv. 724). This may indicate that the deceased was a member of both associations; alternatively, it may be explained by the assumption that the deceased had offered his professional services as a musician to both associations. On the other associations of <i>Asianoi</i> from Macedonia, see the comments on the other such association from Thessalonike in CAPInv. 722.
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XII. NOTES

i. Comments	In his reedition of the text, Nigdelis 2006: 135-46 does not comment on the change from accusative to genitive in the references of the two associations mentioned in SEG 56: 812. The mistake is probably due to the genitive Ἀσκληπιαστῶν <i>Asklepiaston</i> immediately preceding the mention to the βακχίων <i>bakchion</i> .
