ii.	Leadership	On the basis of their name, the association is led by Loukios Rousteikeilios Agathopous, who bears no title.
iii.	Members	The members are called συνήθεις, synetheis (II. 3-4).

iv. Honours/Other activities	The group set up the epitaph for one of their members.

i. Local interaction	If this is an association of sport-lovers, it is noteworthy that its leader bears the same <i>cognomen</i> (Agathopous) -but a different <i>nomen</i> - as the deceased member of the other association of possible spectators attested at Thessaloniki (see <u>CAPInv. 794</u>).

i.	Comments	The most probable interpretation of the association's name suggests that the members were an organized group of spectators for all sorts of sports and shows (see IV.ii, above).
