XII. NOTES

i. Comments	Bricault (2005: RICIS no. 202/0115) considers the <i>therapeuontes en toi hieroi toutoi</i> an association (note the translation of the inscription: 'l'associations des thérapeutes de ce sanctuaire'). The present participle of the verb <i>therapeuo</i> would rather indicate that we are dealing with active worshippers, highlighting their religious identity in the dedication they set up. Their participation in a common economic activity (contributions for the purchase of a couch) does not need indicate that they constituted a private association. Demetrios son of Dallios who took care of the dedication (<i>epimelethentos</i>) and possible of the collection of the contributions, is actively involved in other dedications made in Sarapieion A, always in connection to subscriptions (IG XI.4 1216; 1218; 1219?). He seems to have been the epimeletes of Sarapieion A in light of an individual dedication that dates after him (IG XI.4 1220).
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XIII. EVALUATION

i. Private association	Discarded
Note	Although this group often features as an association in scholarship, the name of the group does not provide conclusive evidence (see above XII.i.) for including it among private associations.
