### iv. Officials

ἀρχιγραμματεὺς, *archigrammateus* (ll. 3-4). As is the case at Ephesos, the *xystos* at Erythrai is attested only in a personal titlature. But while at Ephesos the titles are always *archieus* and *xystarches*, the "chief secretary" seems to refer to specific duties. Maybe *xystos*, chosen by the deceased's wife in his funerary inscription, actually refers to the *synodos*.
