i. Comments	<p>Heron, with his sister, owned c. 21 5/8 ar. (2 ar. of which Heron owned himself) of property in and near the village of Lagis.</p> <p>If the association here is the same as in CAPInv. 1912 then perhaps the group were based in Alexandria, then they simply moved around to participate in regional games as they saw fit.
